

Leaping ahead of British transmission, we look at Quantum Leap's fifth and final Season.

N 26th March 1989, Dr Sam Beckett (Scott Bakula) stepped into the Quantum Leap Accelerator and began a television adventure which continued for almost five years. Trapped in the past and driven by an unknown force to change history for the better, Sam is constantly plunged into the lives of different individuals, with only the hologram of Admiral Al Calavicci (Dean Stockwell) to offer assistance from his own time. It is a journey which has taken Sam through all walks of life - and even into the life of a chimpanzee - within the limits of his own lifetime!

In its first four years, Quantum Leap proved a satisfying cult hit, an unusual blend of fantasy, comedy, drama and Science Fiction which gradually developed a loyal audience and a strong fan movement. Upon entering its fifth season, however, the NBC television network insisted that the show's creator, Donald P Bellisario attempted to break new ground and add some sparkle into a tried and trusted formula. Thus, both the show's theme tune and the tone of its stories were changed, and its 'rules' broken. Sadly, this attempt to increase Quantum Leap's profile and viewing figures eventually cost the series both its popularity and its very existence.

Assassination


The desire to break new ground in season five was shown immediately by the feature-length opener Lee Harvey Oswald, the first instalment to deal directly with a major historical event. Sam finds himself leaping back and forth through Oswald's life between 1957 and 22 November 1963, the fateful day on which Oswald may have - but probably did not - assassinate US President John F Kennedy. While Sam and Al attempt to prevent the assassination, each leap gives Oswald greater control over his own actions, increasingly suggesting that nothing can prevent history from repeating itself.

Sadly, what may originally have seemed an excellent idea does not deliver. Aside from some excellent interplay between Sam and Al and good use of actual footage from the period, Lee Harvey Oswald remains ill-conceived and features an almost unbelievable cop-out ending which renders Sam's leap into Oswald pointless. The depiction of Oswald as a madman act-

ing alone, meanwhile, may prove very hard to accept after such films as JFK which have added a great deal of weight to conspiracy theories linking the CIA and the military (among others) to the assassination. Overall, Lee Harvey Oswald was an exceptionally poor start to the fifth season.

Leaping of the Shrew features Brooke Shields, no less, as a beautiful, young, rich woman who, as the title suggests. must be won over by Sam as a Greek sailor in a mildly entertaining if unmemorable spoof of both Robinson Crusoe and The Blue Lagoon, the highlight of which is the mudfight between Bakula and Shields!


Moving

In Nowhere to Run Sam gets another taste of disability when he finds himself in a veterans' hospital as a marine captain whose legs were amputated after an accident in Vietnam. Sam's mission is to prevent the suicide of a fellow patient paralysed from the neck down while convincing his host's wife that they can have a normal life together, in an excellent episode which includes an incredibly moving scene in which Al pleads with Sam's roommate to keep on going - even though Al cannot be seen or heard - and a bizarre moment in which Sam stands up without legs!

As Leon Styles, an infamous massmurderer, Sam must determine his mission before midnight when a vengeful Sheriff will kill him. However, when Leon escapes from the Project: Quantum Leap Waiting Room, Sam is stranded in the past where he is destined to die, forcing Al to come to the rescue and Gooshie to step in as the holographic assistant in the outstanding Killin' Time, a real highlight of season five. Given a substantial role for once, Dean Stockwell is an absolute joy in an episode which shows Quantum Leap at its best.

Sam becomes a 79 year-old whose UFO sightings threaten to destroy his family and grandson, and invoke some sinister plans in the military in Star Light, Star Bright, an enjoyable episode for UFO fans everywhere, the highlights of which include a great mirror image of Sam playing the electric guitar and an ambiguous ending which viewers will either love or loathe. However, one crucial question remains unanswered: whatever happened to the tape in which a drugged Sam revealed his true identity and some details regarding Project: Quantum Leap to government agents?

In Deliver Us From Evil, Sam finds himself as Jimmy LaMotta, the retarded young man from the season two episode Jimmy. When history begins to

change for the worse without any action from Sam, he learns of the existence of another leaper, Alia (Renee Coleman) and her guide Zoe (Carolyn Seymour) who have their own agenda. including the death of Sam, in a rather uninspired and clichéd episode which features an argument on the duality of good and evil which echoes Star Trek's The Enemy Within and merely serves to introduce a recurring foe for Sam and Al. Nice special effects and a neat ending, though.

Trilogy


The following three episodes formed a Trilogy which focus on an unresolved murder case spanning 23 years in a small Louisiana town. In Part I, One Little Heart, Sam becomes the Sheriff investigating the murder of a man

whose daughter mysteriously vanished a few years earlier. In both cases, the Sheriff's daughter Abigail was the last person to see the victim alive, pointing the finger of suspicion at her. Sam learns that she will die in a fire started by the victim's vengeful wife, and thus attempts to save her. In Part II, For Your Love, Sam finds himself in 1966 as 21 year-old Abigail's fianceé and very much in love with her. When a young neighbourhood boy disappears, Sam must save Abigail again, this time from a suspicious lynch mob. Then, in Part III, The Last Door, Sam becomes an ageing lawyer called upon to defend the 33 year-old Abigail against the charge of the murder of Leta Ada, the woman whose daughter vanished some 23 years before.

Trilogy received a mixed reception from viewers. Critics suggested that

the same characters and setting became tiresome and tedious over three episodes, while fans pointed out that unlike many previous leaps, Trilogy boasted slow, careful and exceedingly strong character development as well as a good story. Certainly Twin Peaks fans will love it! The romance between Sam and Abigail is beautifully dealt with, and the revelation about her daughter is a pleasant surprise, although it is a shame that we do not hear of Sammy Jo again.

Leaping Home

Sam finds himself in the middle of a bank robbery in his hometown, Elk Ridge, Indiana, where he must save the Walters Boys from foreclosure and a greedy banker who has been buying up all the farms in the area to build a mall and will eventually buy the Beckett Farm in the delightful Promised Land, the show's Christmas episode. Directed with customary skill by Bakula, the episode includes confirmation that Sam's brother Tom did indeed return from Vietnam after The Leap Home Part II and a wonderful conclusion in which Sam gives his father John a big hug before leaping.

As a travelling salesman, Sam must choose between two wives and two families, a choice Ziggy cannot offer any assistance with, while avoiding the attention of a pair of bookies with whom his host has incurred a great debt in A Tale of Two Sweeties, a rather uninspired and forgettable episode, in which Sam's solution and the final revelation are rather naive and unsatisfying to say the least.

As a housewife and mother, Sam must prevent the death of his daughter in a sit-in while convincing his husband that their marriage can survive the growth of equality in Liberation, an incredibly mundane instalment, the only two highlights of which are Sam burning a bra and Sam leaping out just before being kissed by his husband!

Sex Therapist

Sam becomes the famous sex therapist Ruth Westheimer to help a young woman who is being sexually harassed by her boss in Dr Ruth, another show featuring a celebrity guest star and a high profile concept. Fortunately, unlike Lee Harvey Oswald, Dr Ruth works as a light-hearted, comedic episode in which the laughs come when Sam attempts to run the doctor's radio show while the real Dr Ruth (in the Waiting Room) counsels Al on his feelings for his five wives and current girlfriend, Tina! Also, watch out for the brief appearance by Anita Hill, who overhears Sam's advice on sexual harassment: Hill recently won a famous American court case on the very same subject!

In Blood Moon, Sam finds himself as an eccentric artist living just outside London, who may be a vampire. He must prevent the death of his young wife while dealing with Al's superstitions in an episode notable for an excellent ambiguous atmosphere which is maintained right until the appalling and incredibly frustrating ending. Al's first appearance and subsequent mood throughout the episode is delightful, though!

The next two episodes were broadcast in feature-length format in America. While Sam attempts to prevent the death of his host, Arnold Watkins, he comes across Alia, the evil leaper in Return. In an effort to please Lothos, their equivalent of Ziggy, both Zoe and

Alia plot once again to kill Sam. Sam, however, becomes determined to take Alia with him on his next leap...

Having simo-leaped, Sam and Alia find themselves as inmates in a women's prison in 1987, where they must unmask a killer, while hiding from Zoe, Alia's former observer and now herself a leaper with her own guide, Thames (a crude caricature of Al), in Revenge. Both Return and Revenge prove to be surprisingly satisfying episodes which almost justify the mediocrity of Deliver Us From Evil, while the conclusion of Revenge is su-

As chauffeur to Marilyn Monroe no less, Sam must prevent the star's suicide in Goodbye Norma Jean. While the episode has its strong points, such as its depiction of Monroe as a real person rather than a star, the cameo appearances by lookalikes of such celebrities as Clark Gable, and Al once again becoming star struck (he looks like he's going to collapse when he sees Monroe go for a nude swim!), ultimately, like Lee Harvey Oswald, it is let down by its concept: we know Monroe did not die; we know she made The Misfits.

As Henry Adams, a famous veteran of Vietnam, Sam must save the life of a friend, Roy, and a young boy, Daniel, in The Beast Within, a moderately satisfying instalment which boasts solid character development, an enjoyable if clichéd - plot and a delightful cameo appearance by Bigfoot!

Final Leaps

The Leap Between the States proved controversial with fans as it breaks another of the show's golden rules, taking Sam beyond the parameters of his own lifetime, to 1862, during the American

Civil War. Leaping into a descendant, Captain John Beckett, Sam must avoid being hanged as a traitor and make sure that he does not jeopardise his ancestor's romance with his future bride as he waits for Ziggy to determine his mission. If you can accept that Sam can now travel to any time period via a relative, The Leap Between the States makes an excellent episode, if somewhat reminiscent of Back To The Future Part III, the highlights of which include Sam's old-fashioned waltz with Olivia and a 'kiss with history' provided by one of Martin Luther King's ancestors.

Sam becomes Elvis Presley two days before his big break and must save a local singer, Sue Anne, from a doomed marriage while making sure that Elvis does indeed become the King in Memphis Melody, a very traditional and hugely enjoyable leap which concentrates on people rather than Elvis and, as such, is very reminiscent of Season One's Camikazi Kid. Sam sings, Al swivels his hips, and saxophonist and future President Bill Clinton makes a very brief cameo!

Mirror Image is Quantum Leap's 95th and probably final episode. For the first time, Sam travels physically through time and finds himself at Al's Place, a bar in a Pennsylvanian coal mining town, on the very moment of his birth, where he learns who has been leaping him around in time and why. Given the power to control his own leaps, will Sam seize the opportunity to go home, or is there one last wrong to put right?

Bizarre, unique and thoroughly perplexing, Mirror Image is an absolutely excellent finale to a classic series, reminiscent of The Prisoner's final episode, Fall Out. It presents a surprising, noble and poignant conclusion which is guaranteed to make you think, and will disappoint viewers looking for easy answers and a happy ending.

Final Verdict

Season five received a great deal of criticism from both fans and viewers as the season which killed Quantum Leap. In retrospect, however, much of the criticism seems unfounded, as once again Quantum Leap provided a diverse range of drama, comedy and action. Bakula and Stockwell were first class throughout, maintaining the high standard of acting for which the show is famed and making even the worst episodes at the very least watchable, while such instalments as Killin' Time, Nowhere to Run, The Leap Between the States and Mirror Image stand alongside the show's finest instalments. What really let the season down was the high-profile, high-concept episodes, the most obvious example of which is Lee Harvey Oswald, which in general not only failed to gain new viewers, but merely alienated the show's loval fans and betrayed its concept.

With increasing talk of a revival, perhaps by a series of films, the final question must be is Quantum Leap finished, never to return? Well, as the show's creator Donald P Bellisario pointed out, never is not a word in Quantum Leap's vocabulary. Anything can be changed. *
